FAIR GENERAL RULES and REGULATIONS

1. The Kent County Fair Board or Designee reserves the right to interpret all rules and regulations, resolve any situations which may arise, and is not restricted by the lack of specific rule or regulation.
2. The Fair reserves the right to cancel any event without prior notice and without incurring any liability except the return of any entry fee paid.
3. **NO smoking, vaping, or tobacco or Marijuana products allowed on grounds; NO outside alcohol permitted on grounds.**
4. All animals must be exhibited in the name of the owner, all products of the soil in the name of the producer and articles of craftsmanship must be the handiwork of the exhibitor.
5. All entries must have been made or prepared by the exhibitor and completed since last year's Kent County Fair.
6. **The Kent County Fair will not be responsible for loss, damage, injury, or accident to any person, animals or property.** All reasonable precautions will be taken for the protection of exhibits. The Fair does not carry insurance on exhibits. Owners may insure their exhibits before bringing them to the Fair.
7. To enter the Kent County Fair, 4-H'ers must be enrolled in project by June 1st of the current year. Only bonafide Kent 4-H'ers may enter 4-H classes. Club members must be enrolled in 4-H Online by March 1, new members by June 1 and must be between the ages of 8 and 18 years old as of January 1st. Clover Division (5-7 years; Pre-4-H) participants must be less than 8 years old as of January of this year. 4-H Clovers are not permitted to exhibit and handle animals in 4-H Shows or sell in any 4-H Auctions. In the 4-H Indoor Division, Clovers can exhibit projects in the Pre-4-H Division.
8. Indoor Division: 4-H & 4-H Clover members cannot enter projects in the same class in both 4-H and Open divisions.
9. Animal Divisions: 4-H members can enter both 4-H and Open if they pay the appropriate entry fees with their pre-registration. All 4-H Livestock and Dairy entries must be entered in the Open division. If entries fees are not paid at the time of entry, fees will be deducted from Premiums. In all other animal divisions, 4-H members can enter both 4-H and Open with appropriate entry fees.
10. Open Division is open to anyone as long as appropriate rules and guidelines are followed.
11. Forfeiture of Premiums - Exhibitors not following rules and regulations may forfeit Premiums. Premiums may be forfeited if exhibitor removes entries early or does not clean up exhibit area after removing exhibit. Division Chair determines that your exhibit is clean. 4-H members who are disciplined and removed from the fair, forfeit all premiums.
12. **No dogs or pets allowed on grounds except for designated service animals.** Dog show exhibitors may be the grounds during registration and show. 
13. All Indoor Open and 4-H exhibits and 4-H animals exhibits will be released after 6:00 a.m. on Sunday.
14. The Fair Committee reserves the right to limit the number of open class entries if necessary due to space limitations.
15. All hoses must have a nozzle; no running hoses.

16. Exhibitors are permitted to enter as many classes as you wish, but only ONE ENTRY PER CLASS, except market livestock, poultry, goats and rabbit classes. Exhibits must meet class requirements or they will be disqualified.
17. 4-H and Open entries will be online through ShoWorks Fair System. Online Entries for Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Dog, Goats, Horse, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, Small Pets and Swine are due by June 15th. All 4-H & Open Indoor exhibits, 4-H Ambassador, 4-H Fashion Revue, Pretty Animal & 4-H Tractor Drive entries are due July 1st. Fair Entry Website: <https://kent.fairwire.com>
18. Indoor Entry Tags will be printed through ShoWorks. Exhibitors will be notified when tags are printed and may be picked up at the Extension Office or at fairgrounds on entry day. Tags must accompany exhibits to Fair **but do not attach.**
19. All entrants in animal fitting and showing may only enter one fitting and showing class in proper age class per species. Novice showman are youth who have not exhibited in 4-H before at the Kent County Fair
20. All 4-H and Open Division Indoor exhibits must be entered Monday July 13, 6:00-8:00 p.m. or Tuesday July 14, 2:30-5:00 p.m. See Clothing Division for exception. NO LATE ENTRIES ACCEPTED! All indoor entries must remain until 6:00 a.m. Sunday.
21. Kent 4-H and Open animals exhibits entered and on grounds by times in published schedule. **Open animals are released after the show, 4-H animals and exhibits not released until 6:00 a.m. Sunday.**

***There are no entry fees for Open or 4-H indoor exhibits or for 4-H animal exhibits.**

JUDGING

23. All 4-H entries will be judged by Junior, Intermediate and Senior Age Divisions.
 Juniors: 8-10 as of Jan. 1 Intermediates: 11-13 as of Jan. 1 Seniors: 14-18 as of Jan. 1
24. Indoor and Animal exhibits are judged by the numerical system: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, etc. and participation. The judges in all divisions have the privilege of not giving a first place or other placing award if it is felt the exhibit does not warrant it.
25. Only items included in this catalog will be eligible for awards. **PREMIUMS ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE AT ANY TIME.** PREMIUMS WILL BE PAID FOR UP TO 5 ANIMALS PER SPECIES PER EXHIBITOR, EXCEPT POULTRY AND RABBITS WHICH ARE ALLOWED 10 EXHIBITS. Premiums are provided by the **Maryland Agricultural Fair Board.**
26. Decisions of the judge are final in all cases.
27. No one, other than authorized help, will be allowed in the Indoor Exhibit Building while exhibits are being entered and judged on Tuesday from 2:30 p.m. until 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday. Exhibitors of vegetable displays, well dressed table, educational displays, collections and club booths will be permitted to set up their exhibit. Only authorized help and exhibitors/families will be permitted in Indoor Building when exhibits are released on Sunday after 6:00 a.m.
28. In animal classes only, Open and 4-H exhibitors will show simultaneously.

OPEN and 4-H ANIMAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Exhibitors must follow all MDA health regulations. Animals must have valid CVI (Certificate of Veterinary Inspection) and exhibitor must have signed species Self-Certification. Current interstate health papers are required for out-of-state animals. Call the Extension Office for further information, 410-778-1661 or email emshill@umd.edu

OPEN and 4-H ANIMAL RULES AND REGULATIONS (Continued)

3. ALL LIVESTOCK WILL BE CHECKED BY THE STATE VETERINARIAN OR FAIR DESIGNEE. Animals may be denied entry or removed from Fair due to disease by: 1) State Veterinarian Office or 2). Fair committee of at least 2 representatives from the following: Department Chair-person; Fair Board Animal Director; and/or Extension Ag and/or 4-H Educator.
4. The Kent County Fair Board committee reserves the right to interpret all rules and regulations, resolve any situations which may arise, and is not restricted by the lack of specific rule or regulation. A 4-H Animal Science Oversight Committee will resolve disputes in Animal Divisions and decision will be final. All protests must be submitted in writing within 24 hours of show.
5. All 4-H exhibitors must have a current, signed, MD 4-H Code of Animal Science Ethics, through 4-H Online or signed hard copy, on file in Extension Office to participate. See the current MD State 4-H guidelines and standards.
6. All 4-H animal exhibits must be shown by the 4-H owner or leasee. Registered animals must be in the name of 4-H exhibitor only. Exceptions made only in extreme circumstances by and with approval of Kent 4-H and division chair.
7. The fitting and preparation of all 4-H animals for show is the responsibility of the Exhibitor. Exhibitors may receive guidance from immediate family members, other MD 4-H/FFA youth and appointed UME Volunteers or FFA Advisors.
8. Prescribed show attire is required for all 4-H exhibitors in fitting & showmanship breed & market classes and the livestock sale. Safe, appropriate attire, including footwear is required at all times. No farm names or other identification is permissible, no caps or headwear permissible except for approved Horse protective headgear. Shirts must have collars, be tucked in, with no undergarments showing. Girls may substitute slacks with skirt of appropriate length. **Note: No halter tops, spaghetti straps, or exposed mid-drifts permissible. Dairy Cattle, Dairy Steers & Dairy Goats** - 4-H/FFA: white slacks with white shirt. Neckpieces optional. **Beef, Market Goats, Sheep & Swine** - 4-H: green or tan slacks, white or tan shirt with green or black neckpiece. FFA: tan or black slacks, tan or white shirt with blue or black neckpiece. **Horses**: appropriate riding clothes and headgear as defined in 4-H 266, MD 4-H Horse & Pony Rule Book. **Dogs**: Attire that is suitable for showing a dog - Boys: slacks, shirt and tie; Girls: skirt or slacks and blouse or shirt. **Poultry & Rabbits**: Same as livestock attire.
9. Only Kent 4-H youth exhibiting 4-H animal projects - dairy, horse, goat, beef, sheep, swine, rabbits, cavies, poultry, and small pets may stay overnight on the fairgrounds. Gates are locked from 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. No open class animals admitted during this time.
10. All 4-H'ers exhibiting the following project species: beef, dairy, sheep, meat & dairy goats, horse & pony, swine, poultry, & rabbits must show current 4-H Animal Husbandry and Quality Assurance Certification, following MD State 4-H guidelines.
11. Animal division stall assignments will be posted by chairperson in appropriate barns by Saturday prior to fair. Stall decorations are permitted to be installed at this time until the beginning of fair, but not prior to this time.
12. All animals must be washed at the fair wash rack.
13. All animals need to be under the control of the exhibitor and not a danger to themselves, other animals, exhibitors or spectators. Animals can be dismissed from the ring by judge or department chair.
14. Bred and Owned Classes (4-H) - The exhibitor must have been the sole owner (not family members) of the dam at the time of breeding and be the first and continuous owner of the animal entered.

**No stall or cage shavings will be provided for any livestock species.
All shavings and bedding must be provided by the exhibitor.**

PREMIUMS

1. Premiums paid as listed in each class. Animal classes paid on scales listed below.
2. Premiums paid up to 5 animals per species per exhibitor, except rabbits and poultry, which is 10.
3. Premiums paid only in individual animal age classes. All others receive a ribbon. Horses will receive earned premium per class.
4. **All premiums subject to change due to availability.** Premium funds provided by **MD Agriculture Fair Board** and Kent Ag Center.
4. Additional monetary awards may be added to 4-H premiums from donors. Donors also provide awards at 4-H shows. 4-H exhibitors are expected to write thank you notes to award donors after the Fair. An award list, donor list and addresses are supplied to winning youth.

The individual must comply with the rules stated in the Maryland 4-H Breeding Animal Leasing agreement and have a completed lease on file in the Extension Office. MD 4-H lease to ownership rules apply.
3. Registration papers and identification, including 4-H Breeding Arrangement (Leasing) Forms, will be checked prior to the show.
4. All 4-H animals must be shown by exhibitor. See Animal Science rule #7.

10. 4-H Fitting and Showing Age Divisions are as of Jan 1. Clover age 4-H'ers (5-7 years) are not permitted to show in 4-H classes. **Novice:** First Year Showman, any age, **Junior:** 8 to 10 years old, **Intermediate:** 11 to 13 years old, **Senior:** 14 to 18 years old.

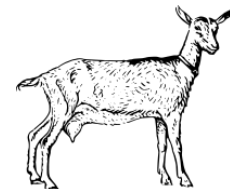

2. **Market animals** must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor. Ownership deadlines: Market Beef & Dairy Steers - January 1, Market Sheep, Market Hogs, Market Goats and Feeder & Prospect Steers - May 1. All 4-H market animals and commercial breeding beef & sheep must attend county weigh-in and tagging day(s). Feeder and Prospect steers attend May tagging.
3. **Breeding animals** must be bonafide property of exhibitor and must have been owned and registered in owner's name by June 1 of current year. Animals in the "MD 4-H Breeding Animal Lease" Program must have completed Lease forms by May 1 of the current year. Youth must comply with the rules stated in 4-H Breeding Leasing Agreement. Registration certificates will be checked by Chairperson.
4. Ear tattoos must be legible and conform with registration certificate. Ears must be free of wax and dirt at time of check-in.
5. Only 1 entry per class permitted in Open & 4-H show *except* market classes. Open exhibitors can exhibit more than 1 market animal after paying appropriate fees. Breeding animals entered by breed and age, can be combined or divided as needed.
6. Open Market animals are weighed prior to show to determine classes. All 4-H market livestock will be weighed in on Thurs., 12:30 p.m.
7. All Open class animals are to be on the grounds according to schedule on show day and leave at end of show. All 4-H animals must be on the grounds by 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, no animals may be released before 6:00 a.m. Sunday.
8. No premiums will be paid for 4-H Fitting and Showing classes. 4-H Swine F & S champions from previous years can compete in age division. All Livestock Grand Champion Showman will be eligible to compete in the 4-H Master Showman Competition.
9. Rate of Gain Contest: 4-H ONLY. Calculated from county weigh-in day and Kent County Fair weigh-in weights. Market & Dairy Steers, Market Lamb, Market Goat and Market Swine Divisions - 1st: \$15.00 and Award, 2nd: \$10.00, 3rd: \$5.00
10. Beef cattle must be dehorned and healed. Registered horned cattle under the age of 18 months, *may* be granted an exception by the 4-H Animal Science Oversight Committee if deemed to not be a danger to other animals, exhibitors or spectators. Request must be submitted by June 1st.
11. Dairy steers must be 100% dairy breed and dehorned and healed before the show.
12. All male market livestock must be castrated and completely healed before the show.
13. All 4-H'ers must have completed 4-H Animal Husbandry & Quality Assurance (AHQA) program by July 1st, as required by Maryland 4-H and Kent County 4-H. Online training is valid once for each age division. Hands on AHQA training may also be required.
14. 4-H Bred and Owned livestock animals will be recognized with appropriate registration and identification at each show. 4-H'er must own the dam at time of breeding and continuously thereafter to be considered for Bred and Owned recognition.
15. Per Maryland Association of Agricultural and Shows and the Maryland Department of Agriculture, all market lambs MUST be slick-shorn prior to getting to fairgrounds to decrease problems from Club Lamb Fungus.
16. **All Beef shows will be unfitted. Animals can only be washed and blown out with NO adhesives, show foam, coloring agents, paints, oils, or other fitting aids allowed to prepare cattle for show. Exhibitors ARE allowed to use hair and skin care products and conditioners (such as Revive, Kleen Sheen) while at the fair.**
17. **New! Swine Show** - Exhibitors may use coat conditioners and skin moisturizers on swine at the fair. 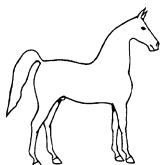
1. Each Kent 4-H member may sell 1 beef market steer, 1 dairy market steer, 1 market hog, 1 market lamb, 1 market goat, 1 pen of meat rabbits &/or 1 poultry. 4-H Market Livestock sale is for bonafide Kent County 4-H Members only. (Clovers are not permitted to sell in 4-H Auctions.)
2. Only 4-H members may take their animals through the sale ring. No uncontrollable animals will be allowed to sell. The specific showmanship outfits for each species must be worn by 4-H'ers with animals in the sale.
3. - Market Lambs to be sold must weigh between 95-160 pounds. - Market Swine to be sold must weigh between 230-300 pounds.
 - Beef Steers to be sold must weigh between 1,000-1,600 pounds. - Market Goats to be sold must weigh minimum of 40 pounds.
 - Dairy Steers must weigh between 1,000-1,500 pounds. Ayrshire & Jersey minimum weight 1,000 lbs, all others breeds 1,200 lb. minimum.
There will be a 1% tolerance of the animal's weight.
4. The Grand Champion Market Steer, Dairy Steer, Lamb, Hog, Goat, Market Poultry and Rabbit must be sold. Sale of Reserve Champions is optional. All Champions are exempt from sale weight limitations.
5. All animals must be shown in respective confirmation class to be eligible for sale.
6. A 2% commission will be charged on all steers sold, 4% commission on hogs, sheep, rabbits, goats and broilers and 6% on re-sales.
7. All animals shall be graded to determine eligibility in the sale.
8. All returning 4-H'ers must have completed a 4-H Record Book for the previous year to sell any livestock in the 4-H Livestock Auction. All 4-H'ers must have current 4-H AH&QA Training Certification prior to showing and selling a market animal as required by the 4-H Program.

HORSE SHOW RULES AND CLASSES

- The 4-H Show is open to any Maryland 4-H member enrolled in the 4-H Horse & Pony project. All owned and leased project animals will exhibit together & must have a current Horse and Pony ID Card on file in the Extension Office by May 1 of current year. Performance Animal Lease agreements must also be on file by May 1. Juniors are riders 8-10 years of age, Intermediates 11-13 years, and Seniors ages 14-18 years as of January 1st. Clovers ages 5-7 years are not eligible to show in 4-H shows.
- Horses and ponies must have a valid current negative Coggins certificate, issued within one calendar year of the show date, to be eligible to show. Exhibitors are required to present a completed MDA Equine Exhibitors Self Certification of Equine Health form at time of check-in.
- All mounts must be serviceably sound. All animals must be attended to and managed safely by their exhibitor. The show chairman reserves the right to excuse from the ring or grounds animals exhibiting unsafe behavior. All stallions are prohibited.
- All riders, including Western riders, must wear protective headgear** with an ASTM/SEI seal while mounted. All riders must wear boots or shoes with heels and long trousers.
- Riders dress in traditional attire as specified by the MD 4-H Horse & Pony Rulebook (4-H 266) - https://extension.umd.edu/sites/extension.umd.edu/files/2023-04/2023_MD_4-H_Horse_Show_Rule_Book.pdf Failure to do so may result in the rider being excused.

A Negative AI test must be conducted on at least 10 birds from flock, or ALL birds if flock fewer than 10 birds. Show Chairs will contact exhibitors with testing procedures after entries submitted. MDA show requirements subject to change and supersede these show rules.**
4. All birds shown must have been owned by and on the exhibitor's premises on or before June 1st. **All exhibitors must register premises with Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA) and have a valid MD Poultry Premises ID Number.** Premise ID Forms available in Extension Office or on the MDA website. 5. Birds must be over 4 months of age and completely feathered.

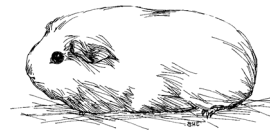

DOG SHOW RULES AND REGULATIONS:

1. 4-H Division is for Kent County 4-H'ers only. 4-H ages: Junior: 8-10 years, Intermediate: 11-13 years, Senior: 14-18 years. Open Division is for all others. Open youth division is for ages 5-18 and Open adult division for ages 19 and over. All Ages are as of January 1. Awards will be given in 4-H and Open. 4-H exhibitors must pre-enter online by June 15.
2. All dogs shall be immunized and have a valid Rabies vaccination. Rabies vaccination number and expiration date shall be listed on dog registration form. Dogs without valid rabies vaccination will be ineligible to show.
3. A complete Dog I.D. card for 4-H project animals must be on file in the Extension Office by May 1 of current year.
4. For 4-H Youth leasing, a completed "Performance Animal" Leasing agreement must be on file in Extension Office by May 1 of current year.
5. Dogs exhibited at the 4-H Dog Show must be trained by individual 4-H'er.
6. All grooming must be done by the exhibitor except specialized breed grooming (i.e. stripping and clipping). No artificial preparations such as powder or corn starch may be left on dog.
7. Open Exhibitors must check-in from 1:30 - 2:00 p.m. the day of show.
8. Exhibitors must report to show officials to register and pick up arm bands during designated registration time.
9. Female dogs in season may not compete. Kent County 4-H exhibitors may substitute another dog for one in season up to 1 week prior to the County Fair, providing they have a dog I.D. card on file by May 1 in the Extension Office. The Extension Office must be notified if a substitution must be made and a signed certificate from a veterinarian must be shown at that time.
10. Any dog holding CD degree from American Kennel Club or a UCD from United Kennel Club may not compete in sub-novice or novice classes.
11. Any dog who has won obedience class with an AKC qualifying score of 170 or above may not compete in that class in a succeeding year. The dog must go up in divisions; or handler must change age divisions.
12. Mixed breeds or unregistered dogs are eligible and may be entered in this competition.
13. When possible, except as expressly altered in these rules, American Kennel Club rules governing the standards of performance and judging of obedience trials will prevail.
14. Fitting and Showing classes will be governed by the 4-H and FFA Regulations.
15. Exhibitors shall be neatly dressed in attire which is suitable for showing a dog. Handler's attire for 4-H dog show:
Boys: Slacks, shirt and tie, jacket (optional) Girls: Skirt and blouse, dress or slacks and blouse
16. Good sportsmanship will be expected of all participants and spectators.
17. The judge(s) may excuse from the ring any dog or handler who falls into these categories:
 - a. Any handler who willfully interferes with another participant or his/her dog;
 - b. Any dog who cannot be controlled by its handler;
 - c. Any obviously ill or lame dog;
 - d. Any handler who abuses his/her dog in or out of the ring.

1. Dogs should be clean (including ears) with coats brushed and free of mats. Dogs should be free of external parasites. Allowance will be made for unavoidable surface dirt due to wet weather. In those breeds requiring specialized trimming or clipping for AKC competition, adult or professional assistance is permitted in trimming/clipping only. All other grooming is to be done by exhibitor in accordance with general rules for Fitting and preparation. See Animal Rules #8 on page 6.
2. Exhibitors should be able to show their dogs at an appropriate gait, show the dog's bite on request of the judge and stand their dogs in an acceptable pose to permit examination by the judge.

- Exhibitors should be able to answer questions on care, grooming and background of the breed.

Kent County Fair 4-H Master Showman Challenge (MSC) 2026 Guidelines

Chair: 4-H Educator and Ag Center Animal Director; Saturday, July 18th, 3:00 pm, Main Show Pavilion



Rules and Regulations:

- The following 6 species will be represented in the 4-H Master Showman Challenge: Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goat, Meat Goat, Sheep and Swine.
- A minimum of 3 exhibitors must exhibit in the species show for species to be represented in Master Showman.
- The overall Champion Showman from each species shall be eligible to compete in the contest.
- Master Showman exhibitors and the Master Showman champion, if still 4-H age, may return and compete in their species and any other species the next year and for as long as they remain eligible in 4-H.
- If an exhibitor is champion in multiple species, exhibitor will choose representative species. The reserve champion of non-chosen species will be eligible for Master Showman.
- A champion may opt out of Master Showman Challenge.
- If a champion in Master Showman is uncomfortable showing a species, they may opt out and receive a 6th place finish for that species.
- Champion Showmen that win in their species, will not be eligible to use their own animal that they won with. Participants will draw numbers prior to show that correspond to show animals not their own.
- Each Exhibitor will have a number attached to them during the Master Showman Challenge.
- MSC chairpersons will secure enough showmanship animals from each species and show supplies for the participants in each division to compete in the Master Showman Challenge.
- If there are not 6 animals available in each species, the classes will be 3 animals, and exhibitors split in 2 classes: Exhibitors # 1-3 go first and exhibitors # 4-6 go second.
- Species Show Order: Swine, Dairy Goat, Beef, Sheep, Meat Goat, Dairy Cattle
- Judges will judge solely on showmanship. Scoring for each exhibitor is 1st-1 point, 2nd-2 points, 3rd-3 points, 4th-4 points, 5th-5 points and 6th-6 points. If a youth opts out of species, they will receive 6 points. At the conclusion of the classes, points are tallied and the Master Showman selected. Exhibitor with the lowest score is the Master Showman.
- In the event of a tie score, the tie breaker is a interview. Judges for each species will ask each exhibitor 1 showmanship question each. The youth with the best overall answers will be the Master Showman.
- Attire for participants is the same as your species showmanship attire. Safe and appropriate footwear is required at all times. No farm names or other identification is permissible. Shirts must have collars, be tucked in, with no undergarments showing. Tan or white pants (white for Dairy only), white shirt with a green or black neckpiece.
- Sportsmanship is a must! The participants are responsible for learning about each species being shown prior to the Master Showman Challenge.
- Prizes: Winner will receive Prize Money and a 4-H Master Showman Jacket. Each exhibitor will receive a Master Showman Banner for display. Prize money will be determined by sponsorship.
- MSC challenge committee is made up of the 4-H Educator, Ag Center Animal Director and 4-H alumni who exhibited animal projects and volunteers willing to serve. They will be added to/replaced by new 4-H animal project alumni.

5. All exhibits must be made entirely from scratch unless noted. Commercial frostings, icings, fillings, crusts and toppings are NOT allowed. Exception: Decorated cake classes may use commercial or fondant frosting. Recipe must be included, See #3. No cake, cookie, biscuit or pancake mixes allowed except in the Decorated Cake, Create-a-Cake and 4-H First Year Food Members Classes.

6. Exhibitors are responsible for entering exhibit in the correct class. Read class descriptions carefully. Exhibits not meeting class specifications will be disqualified. *If unsure, contact the 4-H Office for clarification.*

NOTE:

1. Fruit, tomatoes, jams, jellies and pickled vegetables should be processed in a boiling water bath canner, following recommended processing times. This is a safe procedure for acid foods. (Tomatoes should be hot-packed and water bath processed.)
2. Low-acid foods such as all vegetables (except tomatoes) must be processed in a pressure canner following recommended processing times and pressure. (Pressure canning is necessary, because low acid foods require processing temperature higher than that of boiling water.)
3. One Jar is required for each entry except classes 11, 25, 35, 54.
4. Only standard canning 1/2 pint, pint, or quart jars in clear glassware are acceptable. Jars should be exhibited with rings on (will be removed during judging).

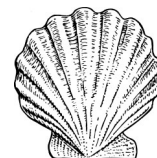
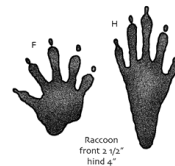

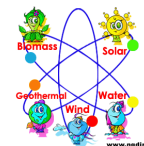

1. All Fashion Revue entries, with the exception of Ready-to-Wear outfits, must be entered in the Clothing Construction Division.
2. **A description of the constructed clothing and Ready-to-Wear garments are due to Extension Office by July 1st**
3. Individuals may enter more than one outfit, but only one outfit per class. *New! Changing tent will be provided for exhibitors.*
4. Exhibitor must be enrolled in 4-H Clothing or Fashion Revue Project for the current year.
5. Judges will examine each garment entry on the contestant prior to the Fashion Revue on a one-to-one basis. Judges will make preliminary decisions. Upon completion of the Revue, they will make the final decisions.
6. Contestants will be judged using the Danish System on the following criteria:
 - a. poise, grooming, presentation and modeling skills
 - b. outfit on model - total look, fit, design, fashion and attractiveness
 - c. garment appearance (construction), pressing, seams, hems, stitching, design match, cut on grain, details of garment
 - d. value of investment (Ready-to-Wear) - selection, cost, care of requirements, quality of money invested.
6. Constructed Clothing Exhibits may be removed one hour before Fashion Revue interviews are scheduled and must be returned one hour after the Revue in plastic bag with tags and ribbons attached.
7. Junior, Intermediate, Senior and Grand Champion will be awarded in "Constructed Garments" and "Ready to Wear" divisions.
8. 2 Seniors per class may be selected to represent Kent County in the State 4-H Fashion Revue. The highest placing participants in each class will have 1st option to attend State Fair. Contact the Extension Office for more information.

5. Recycled Design - member designs and sews a wearable garment from previously used materials. Completed garment is different from original use. Original is not yardage (like bedsheet) but actual 1 or more garments. Additional fabric and trim may be added to complete and must show at least 50% change in construction. Must include before and after pictures.
6. Formal Wear - Outfits suitable for evening or semi-formal events, including men's wear, long or short dress, skirt or evening pants.
7. Business/Professional Wear - Outfit appropriate for job interviews or professional settings.
8. Outer Wear - Pull-over jackets, short and long coats, rain wear, capes, blazers and other garments to be worn outdoors but not specifically designed for a particular sport.
9. Dresses - could include a sundress or other non-formal dress.
10. Separates - Jacket, vest, slacks, skirt, blouse, shorts an outfit appropriate for school or casual affair. (2 or more pieces)

SECTION 2: READY-TO-WEAR FASHION MODELED BY 4-H MEMBER

A complete fashionable outfit with a majority of the main items purchased as ready-to-wear by the participant. Important factors to consider are: value of investment, cost, garment care, fashion, design, fit, etc.

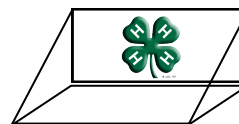

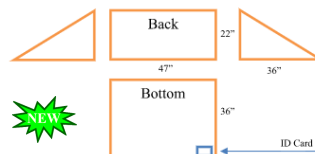
1. Exhibitors and exhibits must comply with all Kent County Fair General Rules and Regulations and 4-H rules.
2. All exhibits must relate and promote 4-H. Copyrighted figures such as Snoopy, Spongebob etc., cannot be used.

SECTION 1: 4-H CLUB BOOTHS

PREMIUMS: 1st - \$20.00; 2nd - \$15.00; 3rd - \$10.00; All Others - \$5.00

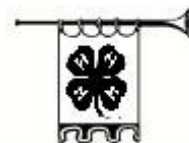


1. Booths are to be pre-entered by club leader. Each club may enter one booth.
2. All booths should relate to some phase of 4-H club work and include the 4-H clover emblem (minimum of 4") and current EOE Statement "Equal Opportunity Programs" somewhere in booth. Booth can follow annual County Fair theme, the MD State Fair theme (available at www.marylandstatefair.com) or any theme of the club's choosing.
3. **Booth size MUST be 36" wide x 30" deep x 16" height.** The back of each booth should not exceed 16" high. Sides of the booth shall be 16" high at the back and should run diagonally to the floor of the booth. (Plans are available from Extension Office)
4. Nothing in the booth may be taller than the sides of the booth where the item is placed.
5. The 2 highest placing booths are eligible to represent Kent County 4-H at the MD State Fair. Club responsible for transportation. No old size booths are to be used at county or state fair.
6. ID Card - Club name and County must be typed on a 2" x 3.5" business size card displayed horizontally in the right bottom corner of the booth. Missing cards will result in a score deduction.
7. Booths shall be judged on their own merit and receive a rating of Excellent(5 points), Very Good(4), Good(3), Fair(2) or Poor. New scoresheet is available. Criteria includes: Design & Structure: overall craftsmanship & cleanliness, durability & items fit the booth; Visual Appearance: Fonts, official clover displayed, clover minimum 4", creativity & imagination; Promotion Power Rating: effective & suitable content, clear message & title, ability to attract attention & hold interest.
8. Suggestions for successful booths: Use readable fonts and sizes, make sure to use the proper clover in readable formats, colors and sizes. This is a marketing promotional display, make sure to highlight your club. When displayed, can we tell who the booth is promoting and what for? Be creative with placement of logos, text, graphics and 3-dimensional items.



SECTION 2: 4-H CLUB BANNERS

PREMIUMS: 1st - \$15.00; 2nd - \$10.00; 3rd - \$5.00; All Others \$3.00



1. Each club may enter one banner.
2. Banners are entered with 4-H Indoor Division exhibits on Monday and Tuesday.
3. Banners must be constructed by club members of any type of durable material with any type of application that may be folded or rolled. Applique, embroidery and trapunto are suggested applications. The design must be on one side only and be two-dimensional. Only one idea should be expressed. Banners must be 50" wide x 38" long. They must be constructed to hang on a rod or pole provided by the exhibitor and be no longer than 56" long.
4. Banner may follow annual County Fair Theme, MD State Fair Theme or any theme of club's choosing.
5. The club or chapter name must be a prominent part of the banner. The 4-H clover must also be present.
6. **Judging:** Banners will be judged using the same criteria and point system as for booths.
